A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

It is with pleasure and a real feeling of optimism that the Foundation has undertaken to keep its members advised of activities, accomplishments, and goals with a Newsletter. Although communication with the membership has been accomplished in the past by sporadic announcements, we believe reports on a regular basis will serve to increase interest and participation in affairs of the Homestead.

There is much room for optimism about the future of the Union Mills Homestead as there is for pride in what already has been done in preserving the structure and its contents, so that today's generation may learn how their own earlier relatives existed in America. The Shriver family was more or less typical of a great number of early American lineages which sprang from immigrant-farmers who challenged the frontier and managed to survive and prosper.

The grounds around the Homestead are now under the care and maintenance of the Carroll County Commissioners, who already have arranged for the initial stabilizing of the grist mill, with help from the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development. This basic preservation contract will be completed before the Summer is over.

Eventually the grist mill should become a museum for the implements and flour-making equipment once used there and hopefully the mill soon will he operative for the benefit of tourists. Plans are in the making for that. Other buildings which have been notorious eye-sores for years either will be taken down or stabilized for future use if not complete restoration.

As for the Homestead itself, grants are being sought, especially while the Bicentennial movement is in full bloom, to make the improvements necessary to its life. The assistance of the Carroll County Commissioners also is being sought in this important requirement. Crucial painting and sprucing up of the interior is being done by volunteers, and a Bicentennial grant is being applied for to give this project a big push.

All told, more than \$200,000 already has been committed to the grist mill. Funds for the Homestead and other needed construction and maintenance will be diligently pursued.

The interest and cooperation of the Foundation membership, therefore, is more urgently needed than ever, and I am certain the Board of Directors and others so concerned with the Homestead's future are counting on that support.


